



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What do the scores mean?

Question were rated on a 7-point scale:

- 6-7 high level capability
- 5-6 moderate capability
- 4 and below low level capability

KEY FINDING ONE

There is a gap between **1** knowledge and **2** practice in child mental health capability



Child mental health capability knowledge, confidence and skills scores were 20% higher than Child mental health practice scores


